Scout should bring the following at a minimum (Better just bring your 10 essentials, the list can be found in your Scout handbook)

Extra food and water - Take more food and water than you think you will need, particularly water.

Knife - A simple swiss army type knife is best.

Extra Clothing - A warm morning can quickly turn into a wet cold afternoon. Take an extra shirt and some rain gear.

Matches and Firestarter - A box of water proof matches and a film container with Vaseline soaked cotton balls will get a fire going most anyplace.

Flashlight - Critical equipment if you find your still on the trail after dark. Make sure to have fresh batteries.

Compass - When you reach the trailhead, note on the map the general direction of the trail, then use your compass periodically to make sure you are still heading the right direction. If you get lost, you can also use the compass to find you position on the map by taking bearings.

First Aide Kit - This is a must take item. May outdoor stores sell well stocked, compact first aide kits for hikers. For those new to hiking, make sure the kit contains moleskin, and indispensable solution for blisters on the trail

Sun Protection - Don't forget a hat, sunscreen, and sunglasses. We will be at high elevations (7,000 to 9,500 feet, there is less UV protection form the atmosphere at these altitudes. Use a sunblock with a 50 SPF)
